COMMITTEE VACANCIES


Our Constitution requires us to have an AGM each year in July and elect a new committee. Nomina-

JULY GUEST ACT PATRICK EVANS

July sees the return of a good friend of this club, Patrick Evans. Patrick grew up playing folk music in the Geelong region during the 1970s and 80s. A quick listen to Patrick's music reveals the same musical heritage that spawned masters like Shane Howard and Mick Thomas. But Patrick chose guitar making (or rather, it chose him) and for many years music has been an accompaniment to his career as a luthier at Maton Guitars. Not that he's been idle. Patrick has performed with a veritable who's who of Australian folk music including Danny Spooner, Ross Ryan, Hugh McDonald, Janette Geri, Marcia Howard and more recently Suzette Herft. These days Patrick has stepped out on his own to focus on his biggest love in music, the writing and performing of his own songs


MUSICIAN'S MARKET

LUTHIER Patrick Evans describes himself as a "Luthier" What does that mean?

A **luthier** (<u>/'lu:tiər/ loo-ti-ər)</u> is someone who builds or repairs <u>string instruments</u> generally consisting of a neck and a sound box. The word "luthier" comes from the <u>French</u> word <u>luth</u>, which means <u>lute</u>. A luthier was originally a maker of lutes, but the term now includes makers of stringed instruments such as the <u>violin</u> or <u>classical guitar</u>. A luthier does not make harps or pianos, as these require different skills and construction methods because their strings are secured to a frame. The <u>craft</u> of making string instruments, or lutherie (sometimes spelled



luthiery), is commonly divided into two main categories: makers of stringed instruments that are <u>plucked</u> or strummed, and those that are <u>bowed</u>. Since bowed instruments require a bow, the second category includes a subtype known as a <u>bow maker</u> or archetier. Luthiers may also teach string-instrument making, either through <u>apprenticeship</u> or formal classroom instruction.

EASTER 2017 A report from our roving reporter Alan Lazarus

This festival is a little different to most – it is held over the entire Easter week, every year, at Wagga Wagga (NSW).

The festival is aimed at the "Grey Nomad", that is the over 50's group of campers, caravanners, etc, that haunt the highways and byways of Australia every holiday period.

Brainchild of musical identities Jim Haynes and Grant Luhrs, the festival is now in its 6th year and caters to around 500 units (caravans, motorhomes, etc).

It features live entertainment – a two hour variety show at brekky time, and an evening show with feature artists. Visiting artists have included the likes of Mike McLennan, Lucky Star, Frank Ifield, Lisa Crouch, Wayne Horsborough, etc.



Throughout each day there are various workshops and sessions including poetry, songwriting, instrument tuition, arts & crafts, etc, as well as Games and competitions open to all. The Talent Night is a real buzz, open to all comers in several categories, and attracts an audience of around 800!

As expected there are pop-up concerts and jams all over the place, at all hours of the day and night. A full compliment of mobile food vans keeps the tummy full,

while several camping gear suppliers are also on site for spares and repairs.

The last day is an Open Day for members of the public and incorporates a huge market which welcomes buskers of all varieties. (monies from busking are donated to local charities).

It's a great festival, with something for everybody, held in a lovely part of Australia. Early bookings are recommended as campsites are limited. Check it out on the Web or Facebook.
